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AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

7 Colony Emergency Siren System

Soon we can sleep a little easier knowing that the seven villages have an emergency siren system linked to the Iowa County Emergency notification system.

The Federal Signal, outdoor warning sirens were installed last week, one in each Amana village, and will be tested in about two or three weeks. The sirens were erected by the Iowa County Emergency Management Department. They chose the location of each siren's site based upon operational requirements, the location of the nearest electrical power source and the layout of the village.

Josh Humphrey, Iowa County EMD director, explained that these are audible sirens that are designed to be heard from a mile away. The sirens in Amana and Middle Amana are larger and meant to be audible from even further away.

As he noted, "They are currently up but not online yet. The vendor will be coming back to do a start-up and 3 minute audible test on them in the next few weeks. Once they are online the county does siren testing once a month on Sundays at 6 pm through the severe weather season. That is the only audible testing that will be done." He added that his department will publicize the day and time of the tests so that residents will be aware.

Humphrey said that the sirens would be sounded in the event of three kinds of emergency situations, primarily, "70 mph plus forecasted or observed winds; tornado warning for Iowa County; 2 in diameter hail forecasted or observed. They are outdoor warning sirens so they are designed to get you indoors to shelter for these types of events."

The sirens are activated by radio from Iowa County central dispatch in Marengo, the same system that we call in the event of a 911 emergency. The radio/ computer activation system allows the county central dispatch to turn on and turn off the sirens as required in each situation.

The sirens were installed at a cost of over \$163,000. Iowa County received a federal Homeland Mitigation grant through Iowa Homeland Security. This grant was matched by an Amana Society contribution of \$24,000, a \$1,500 donation from the Amana Colonies Sportsmen's Club of Homestead, along with a donation from the Amana Community Chest that will be made once the annual Community Chest fund drive has concluded. Residents who wish to make an individual contribution may do so via the Amana Community Chest. The Amana Society Service Co. helped install the sirens and will be donating their electrical power.

"This project was a joint effort and we are very grateful to the Amana Society and Russ Eimers for their help in installing the sirens and their contribution to the project," said Humphreys.

Greg Luerkens, Amana Society president, said that ASI is grateful to Chris Herr, Amana Fire Department, for bringing this important community safety project to the Amana Society and for working to facilitate the donation.

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People would always say how good dad was to mom. That's true, but they never knew the other side of the story. Dad would bring people home and she would always welcome them with good food and interesting stories.

Mom may not have gone to college, but she read and loved poetry. One time my college professor was at our house and for some reason spoke about Geoffrey Chaucer. Mother recited the first part of "Canterbury Tales" in the old English nearly knocking my professor off the chair.

She also knew more than the first stanza of the "Star Spangled Banner" and had my sister and me reciting poems by Longfellow before fourth grade. Having us learn our Christmas verses was a real problem though.

Mom never felt loved. Her mother died before she was even three weeks old so her grandmother and aunt raised her. She always felt that certain people blamed her for her mother's death. It wasn't until daddy came along that she truly knew love. Like my Charlemagne and me, they lived only a few miles apart and knew each other, but never dated.

Daddy did not want to marry until he got out of the Navy. So in February of 1946 my Grandpa Peter, Uncle Carl and mother drove up to Minneapolis to meet his train.

The next month, on her birthday (March 19) they got married in Uncle Carl's living room by Dr. Mortal and moved in upstairs where Charlemagne and I still live. The next day daddy went back to work on the farm.

She had a determination to have her daughters educated no matter what the price. The oldest one was a problem since she had issues reading, so mother would practice with her every day and allow her comic books.

The oldest daughter was not at all athletic while the youngest one was in basketball, chorus and band.

The irony is that both daughters are avid readers and have married good men who put up with their stubbornness.

When mom died our father would go to her grave on a daily basis. Jim Honn had an antique store right next to the cemetery and would watch because he was concerned dad might fall. Dad would get back into the car and go to my Tanta Linda Selzer and talk for a few minutes, then go home.

Five years later he would join mom.

REMINDER CONCERNING SOUTH DUMP

The area commonly referred to as the "South Dump," is private property and only for the use of Amana Society (AS) stock holders living within the Amana Colonies. The "dump" may be under 24 hour photo surveillance and closed without notice if ASI and DNR rules are violated.

Absolutely No burning. Burning is dangerous and not compliant with DNR Regulations.

Only organic compostable yard refuse is allowed. Users will remove plastic bags or other containers used to transfer yard waste. Lumber, and other building material, & trash dumping is absolutely **NOT** permitted.

Using the dump is a privilege, not a right, and all dumping will end if Iowa Dept. of Natural Resources (DNR) and Amana Society rules on what may be dumped or the burning ban are violated.

If you witness violations of these rules, please report, to A.S.I. Conservation at 319-560-2459.

LOTTERY TICKETS AREN'T CHILD'S PLAY: Age-Appropriate Gifts are Better Options for the Holidays and other Occasions

The 2021 holiday gift-buying season is upon us. Some adults may purchase lottery or scratch-off tickets for the children in their families as a last-minute gift or because they struggle to think of other options, but research indicates that early exposure to gambling activities like lottery play increases the risk of gambling addiction later in life. Large numbers of young people report having their first gambling experience around 9-11 years of age, and adult problem gamblers report gambling onset between the ages of 10-19. Data from the 2018 Iowa Youth Survey shows that 27.9% of 11th grade students had gambled for money or possessions--42.4% of male students and 13% of female students.

The Gift Responsibly Campaign is organized by the National Council on Problem Gambling (NCPG) and the International Center for Youth Gambling Problems and High-Risk Behaviors at McGill University and raises awareness about the risks associated with adults giving lottery tickets to children as gifts during the holidays. According to NCPG Executive Director Keith Whyte, "The evidence clearly shows that exposure to gambling as a youth increases the probability of gambling problems later in life. Regardless of what time of year it is, adults should find gift options for children other than lottery tickets."

Instead of lottery or scratch-off tickets, consider purchasing these gifts instead:

- Art supplies
- Board games
- Bubble bath
- Candles
- Candy or snacks
- Card games
- Gift cards or money
- Homemade goodies
- Journals or notebooks
- Mugs or reusable water bottles
- Nail polish
- Picture or chapter books
- Phone case
- Puzzles
- Quality time with a favorite activity
- Self-care products
- Stuffed animals
- Toy case
- Video games
