There would be some in our class who would choose to be conscientious objectors saying that the Amana Church was based on not bearing arms. They would go into the armed forces as CO's and become medics, work in hospitals, or civilian programs for the required two years (dur.

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AMANA NEWS AND NOTES

Auto and Boat Theft in Boys Town, Amana

Monday, July 18 the Iowa County Sheriff's department received a report from 4420 H Street in the village of Amana of the theft of a gray, 2017 Dodge Ram pickup truck. Hitched to the truck was a trailer with a 1985 Lowe fishing boat. Both were parked in the driveway of the Amana Boystown neighborhood home, reported Sheriff Rob Rotter.

The theft occurred sometime Sunday night. The truck cab contained fishing equipment and an Apple i-pad.

On the 19th the Johnson County Sheriff reported that the missing pickup, boat and trailer were located in the ditch on Amana road near Highway 965. Later, a citizen reported to Johnson County that they had noticed the truck in the ditch on the night of July 18th.

When recovered, the truck, trailer and boat were heavily damaged and much of the property from the truck and boat was missing.

The Iowa County Sheriff is asking anyone with business or home security cameras to please check the footage to see if there are images of the gray Dodge truck/ trailer leaving the area or any other findings.

The Sheriff reminds all residents to lock and remove car keys from vehicles - even those parked in your driveway - and to keep doors to garages and all buildings locked at all times.

Summertime Stress

Saturday's 95 degree temps certainly appeared to chill the visitor count at the Amana Garden Walk and other activities in town Saturday, but crowds were good at Friday evening and Sunday events.

"We had only 19 visitors and another garden in South had just over 23," said one garden walk homeowner about the event on Saturday that normally attracts anywhere from 50 to 100 visitors. "Heat was definitely a factor!"

Heat does impact tourism that's for certain. "Yes, that and high gas prices," said one downtown Amana merchant.

But they aren't complaining. "Honestly, despite the gas prices we've had a pretty ok summer. Weekends have been very good, midweek less so, but not bad really," he told us. "I can't complain. What's really been hard is the lack of help. We are having a very hard time finding employees."

There are "help wanted" notices the doors and websites of lots of Amana businesses including all the restaurants. We asked several business people in the area about why they felt there is a local labor shortage and here are the replies we received.

"During Covid we lost a few of our good, retired, part-time employees - people we could count on - and now some have just not come back. We don't see as many high school students as we once did from the surrounding area. Maybe because they have more options for work closer to their homes? Or maybe they aren't working at as a young an age as we did? I don't know why but we don't see as many high school or even college age kids as we used to," said a food service manager.

"There are more options for jobs around here then there once were that's for sure. I think the competition for workers is really tough and I can't offer the higher wages because I just can't afford to. I'm just working a lot more hours myself," said one merchant.

"People don't want to work? I don't want to think that, but I'm wondering!" said another business owner.

"I think people have a lot more options for jobs around here. Think of how much has opened in Coralville, Tiffin, Fairfax, Walford, west side of Cedar Rapids in the last five years," said another.

We would ponder the paper long and hard. Mrs. Ruff's original plan was to show us the difference between an autobiography and a biography, but it went way beyond that. It made us "think" about what we had done and where we might be headed.

I sure wish we could look back at our papers and see if we fulfilled any of our goals.

I do not know that Mrs. Ruff must have secretly chuckled at some of them and thought how foolish we were. She was kind enough not to laugh at us and our blunders (which were many) and for that I will always be grateful.

I remember my autobiography very well (especially the title) and would truly like to go and talk to her about the paper.

Yes, I did go and graduate from college, but then things changed and instead of becoming a teacher I became a librarian and story teller. I also got very involved in the woman's movement and embraced many causes that would have made my mother proud.

Although I was sure I would never marry I met a man to whom I became engaged to in less than three weeks and have been married to almost fifty years - not because of my kindness and understanding, but because he is a remarkable man.

Together we have raised two sons who have made us proud not because they are learned, but because they are compassionate people who care for others.

So I am bragging, but if I had to rewrite my paper I would say - "I did not win high awards or honors, but I did do some things that are not always right, but I tried."

People have told me that I will have memories of my sister. I do! I've tried to write some down for her husband, Glen and daughter, Anne Marie, but I have to stop now, for awhile.

I thought losing our parents would be the worst, but I survived. A few years ago three very close friends died in three years - all around August.

That hurt badly, but when my beloved Charlie had a heart attack and two of his friends passed I thought God had left me.

He hadn't! He brought me our granddaughter, Rose, who loves unconditionally. He also showed me some very special friends.

Truly when I say "I love you" I mean it.

I need to stop for awhile and take a breath. I'll keep writing, but please know that right now I'm sort of "fragile."

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MY AMANA SOCIETY EXPERIENCE

We had some excitement at the Amana Woolen Mill last week that I want to share with you.

A television program called "John McGivern's Main Streets" came to visit us at Warped and Woven and the Amana Woolen Mill to film a segment for their upcoming season.

If Mr. McGivern's name sounds familiar, you may have heard of his previous show "Around the Corner with John McGivern", which ran on PBS for nine seasons. It explored communities in Wisconsin and was produced by Milwaukee PBS station WMVS. John McGivern earned five local Emmys for his work on the show.

Mr. McGivern, his producer, and camera and sound crew are traveling and filming his new show, "John McGivern's Main Streets", expanding their scope to cover six states – Wisconsin, Michigan, Minnesota, Illinois, Indiana, and of course Iowa. You can find the show on Fox 28 Sunday mornings at 10:30.

The host and crew arrived at the Amana Woolen Mill Thursday afternoon after visiting Warped and Woven, and wasted no time shooting footage of the looms, the creel, and the sewing stations. Mr. McGivern interviewed Shawn Brandt, Loom Technician, to understand how the looms run and how they're maintained. They next talked with Suzanne Beltz about how the creel works and got some great footage of her making a warp. Between demonstrating the different equipment, Mr. McGivern asked Shawn and Suzanne about their backgrounds and how they came to work at the Amana Woolen Mill. Last, it was time for me to show how to hem and label a blanket. I was a bit nervous and I'm fairly certain my hands were shaking just a little but that's showbiz! Pure adrenaline.

The Amana episode of "John McGivern's Main Streets" is due to air sometime in October. When the final date is known, you will find it here.
