Be Vigilant Iowa County

Iowa County Sheriff Rob Rotter reports that in recent weeks there have been several burglaries in Marengo at the Big G grocery store, Lizzie's Dining Car and Caboose Bar, the Ladies Room beauty salon, the Prime Star convenience store and the C6Zero building.

In Victor the D and P bar was burglarized a couple of weeks ago.

"The common thread in these break-ins would be that the power meters had been disconnected in hopes of deactivating any burglar alarms and video surveillance," Sheriff Rotter said. These burglaries are under investigation.

He warned Amana Colony residents and merchants that he is worried thieves might target other Iowa County towns next, so it is very important to be vigilant and take precautions.

As always, immediately report any and all suspicious activity to the Iowa County Sheriff's Department.

FEATHERS IN THE WIND

There never seemed to be enough electrical outlets in our apartment. It certainly isn't my father's who remodelled most of our home after the 1932 change. He even put in indirect lighting in the upstairs apartment, which I still miss now that we live downstairs.

The main point is when we were remodeling my grandparents' former apartment I tried to do as my father suggested and put an outlet in every six feet. That was NOT enough!

It seems we always have cords running across people's paths since we have so many electrical items.

It sure makes one think what it was like before electricity came to the Amana Colony.

There are whole articles about how houses were wired for electricity. Amana homes were fully electrified long before World War II. In fact some homes and businesses like the general stores in each town and one doctor's home in particular had been "wired."

That doctor was Dr. Charles Noe who lived in the house that is now the Amana Heritage museum in Amana (Western part)

It seems originally it was a kitchen house but then became Dr. Noe's kitchen (not to be confused with the other Noe Kitchen East of today's Ox Yoke) and then finally the doctor's office (it moved from across the street by the then pharmacy (now Painted Cupboard).

Dr. Noe was going through a sad period in his life at the time as his only daughter was dying of cancer.

There was nothing he could do to heal her, but just maybe he could bring some happiness to his grieving family. He went to the local powers and asked if his home could not be wired with electricity so his daughter could experience the wonderment of seeing all the light before she died. It was done and she did see the home illuminated before her death.

Years later I would see a room at my mother-in-law's be rewired some forty years later and would be astounded at how ingenious the electricians had become when wiring her home.

It seems that some of the men working at the refrigeration plant had learned how to wire for electricity so my in-laws hired one of these men.

This man used a wooden thread spool to wind the wire around. Frankly I was surprised the house had not caught on fire, but obviously he knew better than me who, upon wiring a parallel circuit in physics class forgot to unplug the wire and now has a scar to prove her stupidity.

Amana truly was ahead of it's time (compared with similar villages). Much of our "power grid" is in the ground, so now when the lights flicker as the power coming from the outside fails, the generation plant in Middle kicks in and we are once again "enlightened." Life is good.

Lean to is 30' long x 8 1/2' wide x 9' to roofline. Remove all old shingles/roofing felt/flashing/edging, etc. Replace rotted and damaged sheathing plywood as needed. Install new roofing felt/drip edge/shingles and ridge cap shingles/flashing.

c. 2023-008. Dennis Kral / 5203 C St East Amana / HP-R / Replace quantity 28 old vinyl and wooden windows with new vinyl Energy Star double pane Lo-E/Argon windows per attached specifications. The photos received indicated a wide variety of windows styles in this house, it should be noted that the south side of the house is the "street side". From HPC: Conditions being that Window World should update its proposal to both change the windows on the south side to more historic-oriented double hungs, and that the grid pattern dimensions on all applicable double hungs should better align with the HP Design Guidelines.

Amana Colony Easter Eggs

Yes, spring is springing hence we are seeing colony dyed Easter eggs.

Amana Colony Easter eggs are a longtime cultural tradition. These beautifully bright, glossy eggs have been part of Amana Colony Easters for generations. Starting shortly after the Amana Inspirationists arrived here in 1855, they began recreating some of the holiday time traditions of Germany and Switzerland. At first such things were thought frivolous and a waste of precious resources, but pioneer life had enough privations so a few of the beloved traditions from home were imported to Iowa. Baking sugar cookies cut in the shape of chicks and rabbits and dyeing Easter eggs were among those traditions they wanted to recreate here in Iowa for their children.

In old Amana Easter egg hunts were arranged at each communal kitchen house. The hunts were held on the Saturday before Easter. Each kitchen invited the children from the families that dined at that kitchen, plus the grandchildren, children, nieces, nephews, younger sisters and brothers of the women who worked at the kitchen house, so many Amana colony children went to two or more hunts, as they had sisters and aunts who worked in the kitchens. The kitchen house women baked sugar cookies they cut with cutters made by the village tinsmith. Sitting rabbits, leaping rabbits, chickens and hens, geese and fish were popular cookie cutters for Easter. The most prized cookie was the 8-inch long "running rabbit" cookie. These were given, one per child, and the name of the child was written on the cookie in white icing.

Eggs were dyed using the Amana "glue method." Now about a dozen years ago I was in Switzerland at Eastertide and found dyed eggs for sale in Swiss grocery stores that looked just like our Amana Colony eggs, so I feel fairly safe in reporting that this is a Swiss "thing." At any rate the colony method, while no secret per se, is a little hard to describe but it involves mixing food-safe dye with a crystalized glue or cooking gelatin. Then cooking it until it forms a thick, jelly-like consistency, then allowing that to cool and harden. Then you boil the eggs and roll or rub the hot hard-boiled eggs in the jelly-like dye. Eggs dyed bright blue, electric yellow, neon red, deep purple and stunning green are prized, but my favorite are the "end of day" eggs made when bits of two or more colors of dye are mixed together and the resulting eggs are a swirling, marbled, combination of colors.

This year the price of eggs has made the traditional Easter eggs a little more difficult to find, but you can find them for sale at the Amana Meat Shop and the Amana General Store. Ask the clerks if these eggs are for display purposes only.
