Memorial Day Weekend One for the Record Books

Can we remember a busier Memorial Day weekend in the Colonies?

With multiple Thursday, Friday and Saturday evening musical performances in the area folks had plenty to choose from, but all venues seemed cheerfully busy when we checked around.

Then there was the hugely busy Saturday at the 31st annual Iowa Renaissance Festival at the Middle Amana Park. Sunday and Monday were also popular but Saturday was one for the record books literally.

Saturday morning by 11 a.m. there traffic was backed up on Highway 220 around the Lily Lake. Soon the parking area at the park was full and spillover parking at the Amana Elementary and in Middle Amana meant that folks were walking to the festival at the park. Traffic continued to be jammed in and out of the park as perfect weather meant "record crowds" for the event.

With the traffic in and out of Middle it reminded older residents of the days in the 1970s and 1980s when Oktoberfest was held at the Middle Park.

Saturday evening some residents wondered if perhaps the renaissance festival has outgrown the park and needs to be relocated to the much larger Amana Colonies RV Park?

"This traffic in Parkview is pretty overwhelming," said one a Parkview resident. "And it's two weekends."

Saturday night TKM hosted Funkdaddies at the Amana Performing Arts Center with over 100 people attending the moonlit music event. The appreciative crowd loved the performance of soul and funk.

Meanwhile in Amana Millstream Brewing Co. drew a good-sized crowd Saturday evening and another Sunday afternoon when Die Tiefen Keller Kinder performed. Folks brought chairs and enjoyed the mild weather and breeze off the Mill Race. So summer has started in the Amana Colonies.

The sign, called "the Honor Roll," displayed the names of Amana men and women fighting in World War II. After the war the Honor Roll was taken down and stored at the high school, then it was moved to the Amana Heritage Museum where it's now exhibited on the second floor of the Noe House. Though it's a little worse for wear, the names are clearly legible.

The sign has gold stars beside four names: Charles Jensen, a young Amana farm hand who was killed in action in the cold spring of 1945, the first of Amana's war dead; John Eichacker, who died in a plane crash in the Leyte Gulf in the Philippines in 1945; Oswald Solbrig who died on Okinawa in 1945 while his brother was captive in a German POW camp; and Billy Hertel who was wounded on Iwo Jima in 1944 and died in battle on the last day of fighting in Okinawa not all that far from the spot where his hometown buddy had lost his life.

Amana veterans will tell you that the sign should have another gold star. Serving as Acting Assistant Inspector General in Burma, Lt. Colonel Carl Moershel of Homestead was stricken with malaria. Later while in Shanghai, Moershel again became seriously ill. Returning home in 1946 Moershel never fully regained his health. He died in 1953 leaving behind a widow, Marietta, and two young daughters. By then the sign had been taken down and placed in storage. The memories remain and the bur oak still stands.

After dark on December 7, 1941 the Amana Young Men's Bureau met in Homestead at the home of its president, Martin Dickel. The club was formed by a group of civic-minded colony men most of whom were under the age of 30 and all of whom had grown up in Amana's communal system. Just nine years after the dismantling of the communal way of life known as the Great Change of 1932, Amana's young men and women were optimistic about their future. . .

On December 7, 1941 the active pursuit of that bright future, an energetic, hope-fueled rush that had transformed Amana post Great Change, came to an abrupt end. The AYMB minutes record, "Pres. Dickel called the meeting to order after some delay caused by the radio bulletins covering the Japanese attack in Hawaii and the Philippines. All members felt deep concern and it was not easy to turn minds to the business at hand." The business at hand had been, ostensibly, the planning of a community wide Christmas lighting contest. Within months over half of the young men in that room would be gone, fighting the war.

By the end of 1941 there were 16 Amana young men serving active duty in the US military. In 1942, 66 Amana boys left for war; in 1943, 33; in 1944, 18 left; and in 1945, 28 men boarded trains for military training camps. All told, 161 Amana men and two Amana women were in the military during World War II, with many of them serving in combat.

With less than 1,400 men, women and children in the seven Amana villages, the absence of 163 of its young people was keenly felt. Something observed and recorded by Middle Amana author Cliff Trumpold who served in the Navy during the war

later wrote, "Sixty six Amana boys left for military service in 1942, their departure creating a traumatic void, not only in the home, but in the workplace."

Some colony families sent more than one son. All five of the West Amana Ehrmann boys served, as did the four Solbrig brothers.


Brothers George, Walt and Harold Schuerer of East Amana went to war along with their 30-year-old Uncle Chuck. The Graesser brothers, Leroy, Heinie and Elmer, and two Kellenberger brothers, all from West Amana, served, as did the Hertel brothers of South Amana and the Marz boys of Homestead.

Ernest Leichsenring of Amana was the first of the Amana men to serve overseas. He had joined the Marines in 1936 and was stationed in the South Pacific before being sent to England in 1939 to help train British soldiers. Harry Ehrmann and Leroy Nagel of High Amana were the first in Amana to enlist doing so early in 1941. Ehrmann trained in Fort Des Moines and was sent to England, later he would fight in Africa and in Italy. Nagel was shipped to different camps but would end up in Africa and Italy as well, running into Ehrmann in Africa.

Ray Baumgartel was the first Amana boy to be drafted leaving home early in 1941. His pay, he later told Cliff Trumpold, was \$21 a month, only a few cents less than what he had been making as a clerk in the Amana Society "Main Office."

Sometimes as many as twenty boys left in the same day, catching a train in Iowa City. Fritz Marz, Carl Setzer and Hal Wendler boarded the same outbound train. Wendler turned 18 the summer before his senior year in high school and received his draft notice soon thereafter. That fall his school desk was empty....
